Adding a layer of history friezes for interiors and uses own home as a comprehensive showroom.

Inside his 1913 Foursquare in Northeast Portland, CJ Hurley's handpainted border of stylized white roses and silver raindrops encircles the Arts and Crafts/Art Nouveau dining room. The decorative border, also called a frieze, is accompanied by examples of Hurley's stained glass, metal work and custommade wainscoting. Through a window, roses can be seen blooming in the side yard.

The result, Hurley says, is a "gesamtkunstwerk," a German word that means a "to-

thing works together to create a cohesive whole, a goal emphasized during the Arts and Crafts movement.

That cohesiveness is what Hurley and wife, Barbara Pierce, owners of CJ Hurley Century Arts, strive for when working with their clients. Their Portland Foursquare serves as both their home and as a showroom for their business, which specializes in custom-designed, handpainted interiors.

Although much of the company's business involves color and design consulting, Hurley also sells his periodstyle paintings and designs,

tal work of art," when every- everything from furniture to trim moldings.

But it's his one-of-a-kind friezes that truly set the company apart.

To create the custom borders, Hurley and Pierce work closely with each client to uncover specific motifs - based on a favorite architectural element or flower, perhaps - that can be worked into the frieze, making it unique yet personal.

Although it's Hurley who's the master Roycroft artist (a designation named after an Arts and Crafts community) and who can be found in the studio or on a ladder or scaffold, it's Pierce, with her background in the fashion industry and organizational skills, who understands how to fuse business with art.


Both partners have a strong interest in the art and architecture of the international Reform movements, which stretched from 1850 to 1950, although Hurley also sees himself as a modernday artist.

His goal is to integrate his work seamlessly into its setting, "adding a sensitive layer of history to the property" and creating that "total work of art."
